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Summer Schedule Begins June 24

Our summer schedule of single services at 10:00 will begin June 24, the Sunday after Father's Day. Refreshments will be served outside, weather permitting. Please note the following about summer:

1. Sunday School does not meet. Instead 40 Minute Club will leave the service after the children's sermon. Helpers are needed. 40 Minute Club is for children PreK through 7th Grade. Those above this age are expected to be in church.
 2. The choir does not generally sing during the summer, but this year they will continue until July 1. They will conclude with patriotic music for our Independence Weekend worship. There will be a variety of special music options the rest of the summer.
 3. Breakfast is not offered during the summer. Refreshments following worship will be available outside weather permitting.
 4. Church office hours may be reduced during the summer depending on the need.
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Sunday School and Related News for June

We had fun in May preparing a Mother's Day project for all the mothers in the church as our mission project. On Mother's Day all the kids and teens had a great time making their moms a gift from an assortment of projects. We enjoyed a visit from Camp Haluwasa. Finally we celebrated Youth Recognition Day.

Summer quickly approaches and we have a lot of year end activities and exciting events to look forward to. Hopefully, you can join us for most of these. There will be sign ups in Madden Hall to help with 40 Minute Club, Field Day, and our annual canoe trip.

Up Coming Events

- Our summer program and **40 Minute Club** will begin on **June 24th**. Like last year, we will have two groups that leave the sanctuary following the junior sermon: the first group will be for grades PreK-3 and the second group will be for grades 4-7. (Teens who have completed 8th grade or higher are expected to stay for worship. Parents of kids in grades K-7 are asked to take a turn or two running the program in the summer. A lesson plan and craft are provided along with a list of suggested games to play in case the class finishes early. Parents and other adult volunteers can sign up to be a teacher or an aide. Pairs of friends work well together. Parents who sign up as teachers can pick the craft for their week.
- **Field Day** will take place on Saturday, **June 2th** on the field behind the Manse. Jack Cobb will most likely set up his water slide which will be included in the day's events. Races on the field will begin at **10:30** am and include races such as the egg and spoon, 50 yard dash, piggy back race, potato sack race, and the hula hoop contest. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place **ribbons** will be awarded for each event. We will break for a cookout lunch and then resume our activities with carnival games. The Sunday School will cover the cost of food at the BBQ and people are able to contribute to the meal by bringing desserts. **Prizes** come from our own

donations. Clean out your closets and basements. Please bring with you on the day of Field Day all games, books, toys, puzzles, etc. that you are ready to donate to the prize booth. Basically, this is the largest toy swap this side of the Missouri River. Wear your **swimming suits** because the pool and water slide will be open to all once everyone has had their fill of the carnival games. The day generally wraps up by 1:00 pm or so. A great time is had by all. Bring your friends. The more the merrier.

- **June 9th is our canoe trip.** We'll be canoeing from the Wading Pines Campground located in the Chatsworth area of NJ about 30 minutes north up the parkway. The cost is about \$20 a person or \$40 per canoe. (That will be confirmed before we go.) One extra person may be added to a canoe for the additional charge of \$5. Bring a picnic lunch, towel, sunscreen, and bug spray. We'll leave the church at 10 am and get to the site around 10:30. Hopefully we'll be in the water canoeing by 11am. We'll stop for a picnic lunch along the way and be done around 2 pm. Every one should be back home by 3 pm. The church van will drive up and back. Usually we have a bit of a caravan going.
- **June 10th is Teacher Recognition Sunday.** We certainly appreciate the commitment our teachers, aides, substitutes, and sponsors have provided for our kids. It is always an honor to recognize the people who donate their time in such a meaningful way. Please say a special thank you to teachers Dawn Duran, Karen Little, Tina Harvey, Diane Lee, JoAnn Sabo, and Bob Gillis. Our teacher's aides have been very supportive this year and we'd like to thank Jacqueline Bhatti, Kathy Cruz, Fran Tanner, Dawn Houseworth, Jason Imlay, Sheila Mazzatta, Tina Brown, Dawn Lewis, Barbara Hudak, Barbara Hughes, and Janna Beth Cobb. We also are grateful to our many sponsors who support our classes both spiritually and financially. Our program is terrific because of them. We will have certificates and gifts for our teachers, aides, substitutes, and sponsors at the 9:30 service.
- **June 17th is Father's Day** and the last Sunday of regular Sunday School until the fall. We will be making special crafts and cards for our dads. No two gifts will be alike. This is also Graduate Sunday and all graduates from 8th grade, high school, post high school, and college programs will be recognized.

We truly have a wonderful group of teachers and aides and I know the kids and teens are learning so much. Lessons from a Croatian Vineyard

Little did I know when I agreed to go help a Croatian friend's 76 yr. old Mom in her vineyard, that at the end of the afternoon I would walk away with a much deeper and positively inspiring view of chapter 15 in the gospel of John!

I was on the island of Hvar, off the Croatian coast. A few of us had traveled there to see about holding

a Discipleship Training School in the region sometime in the next year or so. As we watched Angelica, the vinedresser, at work and listened to her explain the responsibilities of caring for a vineyard, I felt like the discipleship process had already begun. We were the ones being schooled in what Jesus REALLY meant when He said, "I am the vine, you are the branches . . ."

Here are a few of the lessons I learned that afternoon:

1. *A grape seed is in the ground 3 years before you begin to see the vine push through the soil.* A great reminder that producing "fruit that will last" takes time, patience and trust in what we cannot see.
2. *The pruning process, if done regularly, is just a matter of taking off the leaves and non-fruit bearing growth that appears on the vine.* I had always pictured the pruning process as a big pair of shears cutting through a vine. I thought if God was going to prune my branches it would be painful and drastic. I was fascinated with the fact that as long as the pruning is done regularly (a key point) then it is really not a big deal.
3. *An overgrown, unattended vineyard does not produce fruit.* There was a very sad illustration of this. Right next to the vineyard we were in, was one that had vines covered in weeds and not taken care of at all. When I asked what the story was of that vineyard, my friend said it belonged to the local church parish and no one took care of it - ouch.
4. *Protection from disease at an early age is crucial.* Angelica told us that if a vine gets diseased early on, it will never produce its potential. You must protect the vines when they are young!
5. *The more intense the environment, the better the fruit that is produced.* Enough said!
6. *The vinedresser has an active part in the growth process.* He/she comes to the vineyard regularly to prune and protect. It screams of relationship between the vinedresser (God) and the vines (us)!
7. Angelica was a bit wary of us pruning because we did not know the plants and the process. She was afraid we would take off a potential fruit-bearing bud. *The vinedresser knows the difference between what will bear fruit and what is a weed!*

There is so much more I could share . . . after being in the vineyard, our small group went home and we read out loud John 15. As I read the words, I felt my spirit light up with new revelation and understanding of my relationship with God, my vinedresser, and what it really means to abide in Christ (the vine).

"I am the vine, you are the branches, he who abides in Me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing . . ." John 15:5

It was great to be with you a few months ago. Thank you for your continual support and encouragement - it is a blessing to serve.

How Do You Function as a Pastor?

“I solemnly charge you: proclaim the message, be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching.” ~ 2 Timothy 4:1b-2

At the pastor’s conference in Atlanta May 14-18 we were challenged to think about how we lead the flock of God, the church. They told us there were basically three kinds of pastors:

1. Visionary. These people, usually in large churches, are idea people. They usually have a theme or clearly defined goal, like evangelism, and everything they do is related to that goal. Their strong points are inspiring people, adding enthusiasm, and giving people a sense of where they and the church ought to be going. They are great at leadership development, setting goals, finding resources, and letting people know what is going on. Their sermons are about casting a vision and letting people know what the church is about.
2. Pastoral. These people tend the flock. They are relational and spend their days visiting the sick, counseling, and taking care of people’s personal needs. They teach small classes, do visitation, and always seem to be there when someone is in crisis. They know everybody’s name, and give the impression that they care about you. Their sermons are about God’s love and how God is personal and will always be there for you. These people don’t give much direction, but it doesn’t matter. Everybody knows they care and each person is important. That is more important than vision. Theirs is a ministry of comfort.
3. Custodial or Maintenance. These people are interested in carrying the torch and making sure everything is taken care of. They have a lot of interest in history because they look backwards to find their direction forward. They are interested in keeping the peace and taking care of the church. They are usually hands on, and show up for work days and get their hands dirty. They see the church as the great embodiment of tradition and faith, and have little interest in changing that. They want to pass the faith, the building, and the worship on just the way they found it. Therefore, raising budget, taking care of the building, and maintaining worship are their goals. In a changing world, the church is a rock, not a vision or a comfort. Their sermons are usually about great historical people of faith we need to learn from and be like. The congregation feels safe and secure with these people. No need to worry about big changes. Perhaps the only thing to worry about is what will happen when this person leaves. He took care of everything, and kept the church preserved and secure. That’s what people want in their church, isn’t it?

I could see myself in all three of these roles, but all members are pastors and wear these hats, too. Some people are pastoral, and some want to maintain our traditions, property, and appearance. None of these roles is right or wrong, but no matter what hat you wear, you’re bound to irritate the other two. The others just don’t get what the church is mostly about.

If you would like to give me feedback as to what kind of pastor you think I am, please do so. But be ready for me to tell you where I see your role as well. It should be helpful to us all because the church needs all three. Let’s try to appreciate each other.
