## News from the Deacons

Our annual Harvest Home Collection is a busy time of the year as we collect non-perishable items for the Community Food Bank. You may have noticed that we have a table set up in the vestibule for the collection. **We will be collecting until November 17.** Canned goods, soap, laundry detergent, diapers, and non-perishable foods are needed and greatly appreciated.

We will also have a large box for collecting (gently) used coats, jackets (in all sizes). This also goes to the Food Bank. Check your closets; maybe you have something you could donate. Last year we collected over 500 pounds (yes, that is correct!) of needed items, so we are counting on you to help us out.

*With the closedown of the federal government and other economic downturns the Community Food Bank has experienced unusual demand. Recently The Press and Channel 40 ran stories showing many empty shelves. People were being turned away. We are also collecting coats for the City of Absecon to distribute to needy families right here in Absecon. This Thanksgiving season is our opportunity to make a difference. Please help.*

## Missionary Update – Lisa Whitaker

I walked up to passport control in the Miami airport. The officer asked me where I was coming from and I replied, “Haiti”. He said, “there on a mission trip?” I was a bit taken back as that is not usually the next question that comes from the border guards. I said, “yes, why did you ask that question?” He said, “well pretty much everyone that goes to Haiti is either a missionary or a relief worker”. I had noticed on my plane both coming and going, that there were several mission teams with matching t-shirts and some type of slogan across their shirts indicating they were from a certain denomination or humanitarian group. I had a mixture of thoughts as I considered the enormous number of people and resources that are going in and out of Haiti. On one hand, I am so grateful that even the border guard recognizes WHO is going into help - it is the body of Christ that is in constant flow in and out of that poverty-stricken country. On the other hand, I found myself asking, are we (the body of Christ) making a difference????

We will be asking Senior Youth, A2J and Lions & Lambs to help to bring these items down to the Nursery each week. On the final Sunday (11/17), the youth groups will place all items for donation in the back room (garage) for pick up by the Food Bank.

A big thank you to the youth groups for their muscle power in bringing all the items out to the garage. We truly appreciate everyone’s generosity during this season of Giving Thanks.

As you know I have traveled to many places around the world in my 22+ years of mission work, but I was disturbed as I walked around St. Marc, Haiti. This town was not really affected by the earthquake, it is two hours by car up the northwest coast from Port-au-Prince - where the epicenter of the earthquake was. Yet, St. Marc is very depressed and needy. I found the physical make up of the town very run down, full of trash and in disarray. The garbage is so bad that wild pigs and goats wander the streets getting their daily intake of trash and waste. Electricity and water are sporadic. It is hard to even capture on paper what the town was like - brown, dusty and literally full of trash.

It was a stark contrast for me to walk into the gates of our mission property and see green grass and no trash. The buildings are simple, not out of the norm, but they are painting the buildings bright colors. Color is one of the first things you notice when you enter the gates. It made me wonder what the Haitians think who come to the YWAM base for

Sunday school, to play soccer in the small stadium on campus or just to visit. Do they notice the difference? Do they realize that the trash and filth that is throughout the town is not because of physical poverty, but from a poverty mindset? Do they ever think that they too could plant grass, pick up trash and properly dispose of it in such a way that would completely transform their town?

This was all a very obvious picture to me of the effects of our worldview. Voodoo has become so strong in Haiti. Due to the beliefs and practices of voodoo, the physical world is of little importance. The understanding that God created the world and gave humanity stewardship over creation is no where to be found in the voodoo worldview.

Biblical worldview teaching is one of my passions. As I walked the streets of St. Marc, I found myself praying for revelation to come to the Haitian people that God created this beautiful island and He gave them, the Haitian people, responsibility to care and develop the land.

I absolutely loved teaching and meeting with our Caribbean staff during the week I was there. We had about 30 people in the class, half of whom either worked in Haiti and/or were Haitians. We also had staff there from the islands of Barbados, St.

Lucia, Grenada, Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico along with others from Canada and the US. What an amazing group of young leaders. It was a privilege to teach them about starting new ministries and sitting down with them individually as they begin to step out to different peoples and places to share the Gospel.

I am looking forward to returning to Haiti, possibly next year, to specifically teach on worldview. This brings me back to the question, Are we making a difference? I suppose only God knows the real difference all the teams and resources are truly making in that country. But as I think of our staff living, playing and interacting with the Haitian people on a regular basis, demonstrating God's love and creating a place of beauty in the midst of trash, I would have to say - Yes, there is a difference being made. Step by step, colorful building by colorful building, green grass and garden by green grass and garden and individual person loved by individual person loved - there is a difference being made. Thank you for supporting me and praying for me so that I get to be a small part of that difference that is being made!

## In Our Father's House

**Anne Leopold** entered the presence of our Lord on Saturday, October 12. Her daughter, Priscilla, and close friends Joe & Louise, were at her bedside. Anne had been a member since November 1997. She met her future husband Wes Leopold in our church. They had been married for fifteen years. The service took place in our church and burial was in our cemetery.

Anne will always be remembered as a smiling and happy person. To be with her was to feel better about life. Her three children spoke eloquently at her service.

Anne raised her children in Lexington, MA where she sang in the choir at the congregational church and did volunteer work for the PTA, youth basketball, Cub & Girl Scouts, etc. Her career was in accounting on the federal and permit level.

Anne moved to New Jersey to be near Priscilla in 1996 and married Wes in 1998. They had a beautiful life together, but Anne suffered two strokes and spent the last 21 months in the Absecon Manor. During her illness Wes and Priscilla watched, fed, and supervised her care every day. It was an incredible labor of love!

Many thanks to the Deacons for serving lunch, Louise for the PowerPoint and assistance with technology, the men's fellowship and choir for singing, Harold Hawkes for playing the organ and the pastor for officiating. Everything came off just as planned.

**Joe Wilson**, a long time member of our church (54 years) went to glory the same day as Anne, Oct. 12. Joe had served as an elder and a trustee, but his building accomplishments in the 1980's will live on as his legacy to us:

1. Joe served on the building committee that built the Christian Ed. Building, helping design the heating system to include the sanctuary and hall.
2. Joe designed and was foreman of the garage committee which was built by a group of church volunteers in 1984. The building was so well built with insulation, heat, and lighting, that it quickly graduated from being a garage/cemetery storage to a game room to program space where children still gather to sing. The four spacious closets have been a God send to the Fellowship Committee, the Deacons, and youth to store athletic equipment, etc. Three AA groups meet in this space, and they, too, store their stuff in the cabinets along the wall. Thank you, Joe.
3. Joe also oversaw the transitioning of the old Madden Hall rest room area into a storage room, but there were no commercially produced table and chair dollies that would fit in the double door entrance way. Joe designed and built the dollies we use today. He was a master welder and made the piano bench in the lounge as well.

Joe loved our church and continued to use his envelopes and supported our church even though he had been unable to attend worship for over ten years. Joe had been in a terrible auto accident that left him limping and limited for the last forty years. He lived in almost constant pain with a titanium pin in his leg, yet never considered himself an invalid. He continued to draw, plan and execute projects, and love and support his three children, Tommy, Judy, and Cindy.

Joe had been married previously to the late Cathy Wilson. Cathy was the first person to be interred in our columbarium and was the mother of our own Tina Brown, a church officer and hard worker.



Joe was an Abbott Pharmaceutical salesman who took stock options, some of which he donated to our church for a tax deduction and to avoid capital gains. When the church was given the opportunity to buy the house at 19 School Street we didn't have the resources available. Doug Jablonski, the Finance Chairman at the time, figured out a way to procure this property without a mortgage. We sold the Abbott stock Joe had donated at a huge profit and paid cash for the house at settlement. Again, thank you, Joe, for not only expanding our buildings but our real estate holdings as well. This house currently is rented and produces income for the church, but it may someday be a place to house church offices, expand parking, or a place to expand the size of Madden Hall. Thanks, Joe, for once again providing for our future development and security.

Joe's services were held at Wimberg Funeral Home on Oct. 20. A Masonic service preceded our pastor's service. A flag was presented to his family in recognition of Joe's service to our country in the Army Reserves.

### **Legacy And Stewardship**

*“Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” ~ Matthew 6:19, 21*

All churches go through times of grief and remembering, and ours has seen a lot this year. On Oct. 12 two saints of the Lord went to glory, and their services were full of stories that had to do with giving back. Anne Leopold's obituary was full of volunteer organizations, singing in her church choir, loving relationships, and

giving the gift of joy to everyone she spent time with. Joe Wilson's contributions to our church included being foreman of our church garage project, serving on the committee that built the Christian Ed. building in 1978, and designing and building the table and chair dollies in Madden Hall. Both individuals had special and unique gifts to offer, and they did.

One thing I have noticed at funerals is the focus is on what people gave and gave back in their lives. I've never heard stories about how someone stepped on their coworkers to get a promotion, or how someone hoarded money when their family was in need, or how someone built up wealth while those close to them lost everything. (Even if those things were true we wouldn't point them out at a funeral.)

When it comes right down to it, we are remembered for our stewardship. The service to church and community, what projects we helped with, our parenting, family commitments, favors given to friends and neighbors, and anything we did to make the world a better place is what gets remembered. Even the smiles, good will, and friendly hellos are what we remember. That is the use of our time, talent and treasure, which is what stewardship is all about.

As pastor, I see stewardship all the time. I see it in Sunday School, youth groups, serving at Sister Jean's, home deliveries, Prayer Shawl ministries, choir, bell choir, cooking and serving meals, fundraisers, work days, and helping in dozens of little ways behind the scenes. Some of our church officers give hours every week, and some of our employees give way more than their job description requires. It would be nice to recognize all these contributions, but few are ever recognized in life. Some will be recognized and mentioned when we die. All are recognized by God.

As we approach stewardship season, maybe we should have a nightmare about our own funeral. There we are looking down from heaven as people get up to speak about us, but instead of remembering all the good, they only remember our lazy times. "They had a great voice, but never sang in choir." "They loved children, but never taught Sunday School." "Boy could they cook, but they never helped with a church supper." "They could be caring and compassionate, but they never became a deacon" or "They were asked to be a church officer, but always said 'No'." And then people start to make excuses at your funeral – "I guess I should have reached out to them, but they never reached out to me." "I would have liked to work on something with them, but they never wanted to do anything." "I wish I could have helped them, but they never helped others so I assumed they were closed to being helped themselves." "I would have been there during their last days, but it didn't occur to me. I didn't know how to break the ice."

And now wake up. Like Scrooge at Christmas, you decide that this will never be your legacy. It's time to make a difference.

November is Stewardship Month. It's not just about money. It's about our whole lives. It's about reaching out. It's about giving back. It's about making a difference. It's all about priorities, use of resources and how we live our lives.

That is legacy, and that is stewardship. If you don't know how to be a better steward, let us help you. The Talent Bank forms give us many areas of service. Our estimate of giving cards guide us in percentage giving. James Dobson of Focus on the Family says, "We don't give because God needs the money. We give because we need to give it." It begins with our determination to be a better steward, to want to change our legacy.

Stewardship Sunday is Nov. 24. Let it change your life. Stewardship certainly motivates me to change mine.
