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## The View from the Study Window

By the time you read this newsletter, I will have been at the Absecon church for almost two months. During that time, I have been fascinated by the view out the study window.

Over the years, I have had many different views from the pastor's studies where I have served. One study window gave me a view of a golf course; another looked over woods. One study window was stained glass. The only thing I could see from it was an alley when I swung it open. On the Great Plains, all I could see from one church was the county court house; another gave me a view of fields.

The Native American churches I served had no studies on the church grounds. I could see miles and miles of rolling hills. In fact, one church on the reservation was named, The Mayasan Presbyterian Church. "Mayasan", means, "gray hills".

Studies in churches I served overlook many places. All have had interest to me and all gave a view of the God's creation. All places, urban, rural, small town and resort town are part of creation over which we have been given stewardship.

As I look out the study window at Absecon, I see a busy street. I can also see trains going by on occasion. The busy street scene is consistent with the busy church. This is a good thing and a cause for celebration. There is nothing so sad as a church building that lies empty all week long only to be populated on Sunday mornings. Many of our urban churches are empty all week and that is sad when these buildings could be sanctuaries in the troubled waters of hopelessness that we find in so many places.

I mention this only because we have a job ahead, you and I. We will be planning how to stay busy and, not only relevant, but vital into another century. In other words, we will be asking, "How can we be a sanctuary in the troubled waters of hopelessness and yearning that surround us?" That is the job of the transition period in the life of the congregation.

Maybe the view out the study window will change in time and maybe our entire vision for the church in the future will not include a study for the pastor as we know it, but instead will include a virtual study. Who knows?

I am excited to find out, aren't you? Granted; this means that many things that we take for granted will have to change and many ways that we find comfortable will be questioned, but that is part of growing.

Let's get to work!

### Mission/Evangelism

The Mission/Evangelism Committee completed the May walk through of the **Bakely House**. The house remains in good shape. We are preparing for a transition in June when the current family moves on and a new family prepares to move in on July 15, 2015.

The Mission/Evangelism Committee approved the allocation of \$1000.00 for disaster relief in **Nepal** through our **Presbyterian Disaster Relief Program**. Session approved the motion to allow the congregation to contribute to a special offering over the course of two Sundays to increase our contribution even further. These Sundays will be May 24 and May 31, 2015. There will be special envelopes placed in the pew racks for this purpose. Thank you for your support.

The committee also designated \$200 for the **Jesus Cares Christian Ministry** which offers support to Christian children in Pakistan in conjunction with the deacons.

**Family Promise** is getting closer to its goals. An upcoming **Art Auction** will take place on **Saturday, June 6<sup>th</sup>, at 8 pm** at the St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Galloway Township. Approximately 25 people have bought tickets and plan to make an evening of it all in support of **Family Promise**. We definitely want our presence felt since we are now a host church and linked to the success of this program. There will be wine and cheese, hors d'oeuvres, and desserts. They will pay us 0.50 a pound (Really...no rollerblades!) and that money will go to Family Promise. Then we'll set up the next box, so this will be an ongoing fundraiser. A special **Mission Auction** will take place on **Saturday, June 20<sup>th</sup>**, at the **Ocean Heights Presbyterian Church from 6-8 pm**. Our van will leave at 5 pm. Many people from all the Presbyterian churches, including

our own, are donating services, gift certificates, baskets, and other items. Some you can win by chance, by silent auction, and a few, such as a time share condo in FL, will go to the live auction. All proceeds will benefit Real Partners Uganda and the Mustard Seed Academy. We already support this great mission and can help even more attending the Mission Auction. We selected our **Away Mission Trip** destination. We are now making arrangements to participate in the **Christian Appalachian Project in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky**. We are looking into the dates that we will attend. We will be driving down to Kentucky on a Sunday and returning home the next Friday. It will cost each member \$400 to participate, but willing sponsors have provided incredible assistance in the past. The committee will likely offer each attendee \$100 toward the cost. All meals are included and the projects prearranged. Look for upcoming announcements about the exact dates. We'll have an organizational meeting and hope that many members will be able to attend.

We are looking into a **Family Retreat a Keswick**, but we wanted to be certain about the away mission trip dates before we locked in the dates for this event. More news to follow soon.

**Family Fun Day** will be the focus of our next meeting. Approximately 500 people from the community came out to spend a day with us last summer. It takes a lot of people to keep this running smoothly so hopefully you will be willing to help. Stay tuned for sign-ups.

### Open Doors . . .

I love taking pictures of doors. For some reason, doors are beautiful to me. They have so much character, come in so many different varieties and the best thing is - there is something yet to be discovered behind a door. A closed door is intriguing and a challenge - what is behind it? How can I open it? Is it safe to open? An open door is also intriguing and challenging - Do I dare look in? Is it safe to enter? Can I see anything from this side? Discovering what is on the other side requires actually walking THROUGH the open door - or if it is a closed door, banging it down first and THEN walking through it.

These last few years as I have visited Croatia - it has been a series of doors set before me. Some have been closed quite tightly while others have been cracked open or even wide open. The key has been to actually walk through to the other side. My latest trip felt like I had walked through a series of opened doors. My friends there on the Dalmatian coast had set up 5 different seminars for me to do. A few of these seminars were open doors that I had walked through last year and they wholeheartedly invited me back to join them again and share. Two of the seminars were NEW opportunities. One was a Catholic confirmation class for a group of 35 16 year olds. This door has been cracking open in the last few years and last month it swung right open and beckoned me to boldly walk through it. I had an amazing time on the island of Hvar with this group of high school students. The local priest was so encouraging and open for me to share with his class how Holy Spirit has guided me in my missions work. I began to teach at 8:30 pm and finished at 9:45pm - you could have heard a pin drop as these students were as amazed as I how God leads and guides us step by step. I know many of you were praying for my time there and God definitely heard your prayers and His presence was tangible!

The second unexpected door that opened was with a university crowd. Their group leaders had come to one of my seminars last fall and asked if I would travel up the coast a few hours to share with their university students. It is such a privilege to GO and disciple in places where there is very few local resources and often times very little input. The hunger for God's Word and stories of faith is contagious. I have seen first-hand how the lack of resources and input is a gift in that these precious people truly soak in what is shared and do not take for granted the privilege of hearing God's Word and gathering together as His Body.

What I discovered this time in Croatia was that stepping through these open doors led me to meet amazing people and to share God's love in dry, but thirsty places. The opportunities on the other side of those doors are limitless. I wonder how many of you have doors set before you right now. Don't hesitate to step through or even pound them down . . . you never know what God-size opportunity is on the other side.

I will be traveling to our Kona, Hawaii campus in June to do some staff training and will also be attending a graduation ceremony for some of our students who will complete their Discipleship Training School. It will be exciting to witness them all walking through a new open door!

## **Remember Your Heritage**

We are all proud of the condition of our cemetery. It reflects well on our Church and is seen by thousands of people every day as they drive through town on New Jersey Avenue. This has not come about by accident. Your Cemetery Committee oversees the maintenance of the cemetery grounds and authorizes the expenses incurred.

Annually, it costs about \$8,500.00 in materials, equipment, maintenance of equipment and salaries. While we have a healthy Trust Fund, it is not increasing, but, in fact, is declining. The Committee is dependent for income on the sale of niches and plots and interest from the investment of the Trust Fund. Lately, we have bought back more plots than we sold.

In the past, when someone passed on, the cemetery has been remembered by church members and their families with a bequeath either as a gift from the survivors or in the will of the person who died. We encourage you to consider the need of the cemetery for income by remembering us in your will. Our ability to raise revenue is limited. The committee wants to continue the high level of maintenance and keep our cemetery in a “park – like” condition and an attraction on the Avenue.

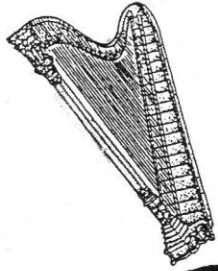

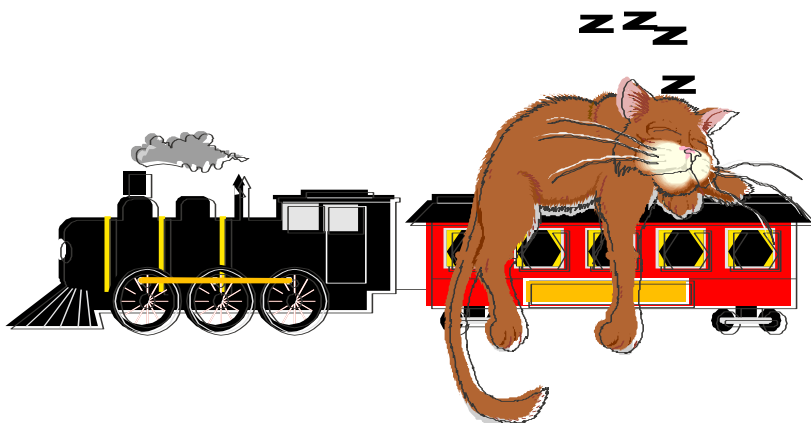
