

World Communion to be Observed October 4

The celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Federal Council of Churches recognized the need for international healing, unity and good will among the Christian community and extended the invitation to several denominations around the world, that it became widespread. With nations at war against one another, this celebration symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

In this time of sectarian, political, and international tension it is important that we stand together to demonstrate the ideals and hopes of our Lord expressed in His prayer before His crucifixion that we might all be one. (John 17: 22)

Please plan on being with us as we gather at our Lord's Table on October 4 at both services.





Mission/Evangelism for October

The Bakely House: Our guests have settled nicely into their new home in the Bakely House. We are hoping to help one of our guests find a job and to offer financial guidance.

Family Promise: Leo Ransone has stepped forward as our Family Promise Coordinator. We will begin preparations for program operation with a near starting date in sight...hopefully December. Family Promise is still in discussion with Zion Lutheran in Egg Harbor City as our potential Day Center. Be listening for news about Club 172 and ways you can help support this program financially. Also purchase a Boscov's coupon *Friends Helping Friends* to further your support. We are waiting on news from Presbytery to see if they approved a financial grant for the program.

Away Mission Trip: We will hope to generate interest in the away mission trip to Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, by showing a short media presentation as a minute for mission. Then we will schedule a meeting to see who is interested and when the best time will be to schedule the trip. Stay tuned.

Family Retreat at Keswick: The committee decided to schedule a retreat after our new pastor is installed. Then our retreat will enable families and our pastor to enjoy a bonding experience.

Family Fun Day: We were talking about scheduling this major event closer to Labor Day so that people will be eager to join our Sunday School, Youth programs, and any other program that will start up at that time. We were pleased with the response from the community and many community members came out for the *Movie Under the Stars* on Sept 18th. Many members from the community have expressed interest in Sunday School and King of Kings Youth Program. Some folks have already started attending church and Sunday School. We have made the major purchases for this event to sustain itself in the years ahead. We just need to keep supporting it.

Evangelism: We would like lay assistants to recognize new families when they attend church, ask them to stand if possible, and to invite them to join us for coffee hour. We would also like to give the same goodie bags that we handed out on Family Fun Day to new families who attend the church. In fact, anyone can take a goodie bag and deliver it to any family that might be new to our area or that might be looking for a church family. Also, we will be distributing these goodie bags to the families that move into Absecon Gardens as a welcome gift. We thought that we could also hand out attractive bookmarks to new families that could have key information on the back regarding our church and its programs. We also thought a guest book during coffee hour might be friendly and helpful.

Real Partners Uganda: We are currently collecting money for the families of Mustard Seed Academy in a program called Christmas in September. By the time you read this, we will have completed the collection and sent our contribution to Uganda to help support the families with food over their summer break, a time when the school is closed and support from the school is available only through our donations.

Sidewalk Café: We discussed the possibility of offering a coffee, and perhaps coffee cake to go with it, on the church's front sidewalk to passers-by on Wed. evenings from 5:00-6:00 pm. This would be a ministry to establish relationships with locals as they pass by the church. Hopefully, some of our new friends will check out the inside of the church as well, especially on a Sunday morning.

Budget: We will be setting up our budget for 2016 at our next meeting. Any requests should be submitted to me by our next meeting.

A Note from Karen Moritz

I recently returned from my first trip to Hungary. We had a gathering there for all the Mission Coworkers and Regional Liasons in Europe, the Middle East and Central Asia. It was a great time to connect with other World Mission Staff serving in these areas and in our Louisville office. However, it was also a challenging time to be in Hungary. I decided to travel from Prague to Budapest by train and arrived at the now infamous Keteti station. When I arrived after dark on Thursday evening 27 August I was surprised by all the people at the train station. Sadly, I did not know that many refugees had been gathering there for days. During the following days I, and all of us assembled there, learned more about what was happening. On Saturday afternoon I went with some others to the station. I have to say I felt a bit overwhelmed. I could not speak a language that would be helpful, and I felt a bit like a voyeur, looking on the pain and misery of so many people. One could walk through the station, but, there were people everywhere. Women and children trying to sleep, men trying to find food and information for their families. We learned that many people had walked unimaginable distances to find a better life. Many of them had lost everything. A colleague aptly remarked “you know, they are people just like us. They had lives, careers and homes. Now they have been forced to flee lands full of violence in a desperate bid to survive.”

As the week went on we left all this behind as we took a bus from Budapest to the church retreat center near Lake Balaton. However, the escalating crisis still reached us. Half way through the week train service west was suspended and the 2 of us who had come by train madly scrambled to find flights back home. When we returned to Budapest we learned that those desperate to find a new home had begun walking towards the border

with Austria. Over the next few days we learned of the violence once again perpetrated on these already traumatized people. Police forcibly removed them from trains and transported them to refugee camps. Those too afraid to board trains began, once again, to walk. They walked down busy highways and along train tracks. They walked, men, women and small children. Many of them encountered walls and fences intended to keep them out.

And yet, amidst all of this many people in the church struggled to respond in loving and humanitarian ways. Many people were horrified by the reaction of their government and their fellow citizens. The day before my departure, several of us attended worship at St. Columba's Scottish Presbyterian Church in Budapest. <http://www.reformatus.hu/mutat/6861/> They announced their intentions to help even though it seemed to be only a drop in the bucket compared to the amount of suffering. Following worship several of them were going down to the train station. They hoped to bring some relief to the many traumatized and frightened children by playing games with them. They also hoped to bring at least one mother and her children to the church for one night of sleep in a warm and safe place. But how would they be received? It didn't matter, they went anyway. The Reformed Church in Hungary has, in the past and continues today, to reach out to refugees. There is some really good information on the English page of their website at: <http://www.reformatus.hu/our-church/>

The church with which I work, the Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren (ECCB), and the Ecumenical Council of Churches of the Czech Republic have both come out with statements. These can be found on the ECCB Czech website at: www.e-cirkev.cz An English translation for the statement from the Synodal Council of the ECCB is currently being prepared. The members of the Synodal Council, as well as other concerned people in the church, are urging people to put aside the fear and anger that many in the government and press are promulgating. They remind us of the call of the Gospel to welcome the stranger. The path of violence and hostility is not the answer. As people of faith we are called to welcome them and find ways to include them in our churches and communities. Many individual congregations are going this and are to be commended.

How will we respond? This is now the question for all of us, here in Europe and the US. How will we be a voice of love and inclusion? How can we fight the voices of hatred and intolerance? Many people in Hungary and the Czech Republic are speaking out. In a recent demonstration in Prague people held signs saying "Refugees Welcome! We stand against xenophobia and fanaticism." May our voices, and our lives, echo this sentiment as well.




