### **Burning the Hut**

Dear Friends,

I once heard a story about a man who had been beset by bandits in medieval Japan. He was rescued by some monks who took him to their monastery to heal and recover. They did not wish to force him to become a monk, so they housed him in a small hut on an island on a lake on the grounds of their monastery.

The man was happy there and participated in much of the work and prayers of the monks. He ate with them as well. He became accustomed to the place and the people. Yet, he had a life outside the monastery, which he was neglecting. He became stagnant as well as comfortable.

One day after the man had been to prayers with the monks, he discovered that his hut had burned to the ground. He ran to the abbot to tell him of the tragedy. The abbot replied that it was indeed the abbot himself who had burned down the hut.

You see, he told the soon to be former guest, often we can become too comfortable and have to burn down our huts in order to grow and take risks in life.

I was thinking of that story as my wife, Rebecca and I were discarding a lot of things that used to be important to us such as papers and clothing no longer necessary to take with us when we eventually move permanently to what is presently our vacation home in Florida.

Lives change and what used to be essential now only weighs us down. This is true for churches as well as individuals. You are about to see a change over the next few months. In order to grow in that change and take risks for the sake of the Gospel, you might have to figuratively “burn the hut” of presuppositions and routine behavior.

Growth in the Holy Spirit often requires that we move into uncomfortable territory with Jesus as our only guide. It will be an adventure and you will be building new huts, new traditions and new joy in Christ in a new year.

In the meantime, there is still much to do. Pray for your new leadership installed on the twenty-second of January and for your Pastor Nominating Committee. And, I will see you in church.

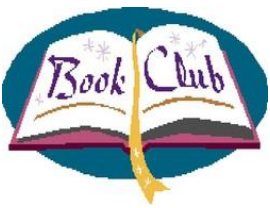
## Women's Circles

“In a staff gathering this fall we were asked to come up with a word describing this last season of our life. Immediately the word **IMPLOSION** came to my mind. As I considered the frailty of those I love (a dear uncle was in his last days and has since passed away), dreams I had for the future dashed to pieces and so much uncertainty in the world, I definitely felt like my world was imploding in on me. **YET**, I also felt a surge of **HOPE** as I went to China and Russia and saw first-hand all that God is doing in these far corners of the world. These thoughts brought to mind a visual of the cellist of Sarajevo - a man, in a tuxedo, with his cello, making music in the midst of war. During the Bosnian war, this man donned his tux, grabbed his cello and set up right in the middle of ruins, rubble and destruction. What did he do while his world was crumbling around him? He played music. He became an icon of **HOPE** - but not cheap, artificial **HOPE**. He represented the real thing, feeling the pain of his world falling all around him yet using his gifts to bring beautiful music to the place of death. I am challenged to an even greater depth to call on **JOY**, **HOPE**, **GRACE** and many other life-giving resources in this season of implosions. I have asked the Lord to help me put on my tux, grab my cello, play music and be me. Help me Lord to use my gifts even while the uncertainty of what is happening around me continues. Help me to resist allowing the pain and disappointments of life to dictate how I live, but rather help me live and play the music of **HOPE**.”
