

TEACH AND LEARN - LEARN AND TEACH - A BEAUTIFUL COMBINATION

My first teaching assignment on this trip was in the beautiful country of Georgia. It was my first time there. The class was made up of all young women and the staff was a mixture of men and women. My topic was the Life of Jesus.

There is no greater satisfaction when teaching than hearing the following from one of your students - "I have found myself falling more in love with Jesus this week as we learn about His life". Boom - that right there is enough to spur me on for another few decades at least! It was a wonderful time with the young women. Several spoke either Russian or English, so I was able to communicate with just about everyone without a translator.

The leaders of the school know how much I love history so on one of my free afternoons they took me on a bit of a history tour. I learned about how Georgia became identified as a Christian nation - the story is inspiring.

A young Christian woman named Nino from Cappadocia, Turkey went to Georgia in 320 AD, some say as a slave, others say specifically to preach the gospel. Regardless, she was sought out by the Queen who was very ill and had heard of Nino's faith. Nino prayed for her and the Queen was healed. This led to the Queen converting to Christianity and asking to be baptized. Her husband King Mirian III was not impressed with this conversion by his wife and threatened to divorce her. Apparently God had other plans!

The King went out on a hunting expedition and was struck blind due to total darkness and fog in the woods. He was desperate and frightened. In his desperation, he cried out, in his words, "to the God of Nino" - and he prayed, "If indeed that Christ, whom the captive (Nino) has preached to my wife, is God, then let Him now deliver me from this darkness, that I too might forsake all gods and worship Him."

As soon as he finished the prayer, the fog lifted, light appeared and the King was able to find his way back home. As a result of this miracle, the King renounced idolatry and was baptized as the first Christian King of what is now Georgia (it was called Iberia at that time). In 326 AD, King Mirian III made Christianity the state religion and proclaimed Iberia (Georgia) a Christian nation.

I was able to visit the grounds where he had the first cathedral built in 379 AD.

Nino is a heroine to the Georgians and there are well over 100,00 young women named Nino in Georgia presently.

It was a privilege to both teach about Jesus and learn about Nino in my visit to Tbilisi, Georgia. I find it so important to pass on these treasured stories of the great community of saints/ friends of the past who have gone before us. It is because of them that we have a story to tell.

It is because of their faith and obedience, we too are inspired to go and share, to pray for people and to be an instrument in God's hands to see His kingdom come and his will be done here on earth as it is in heaven.

Thank you for your continued prayers and on-going support, Next month I will share of yet another hero of the faith whose grave I had the opportunity to visit just last week.



Tips for Healthy Eating on a Budget

Get the biggest nutrition bang for your buck

- Plan out a few meals for the week and make your shopping list based on these ingredients.
- Choose meatless meals. Plant proteins such as beans and tofu are generally more affordable than meats and fish.
- Don't shop on an empty stomach. Munch on a piece of fruit or some nuts before entering the store.
- Allow for flexibility in your shopping list if fresh produce or poultry and fish are on sale, purchase extra quantities and freeze them for later use. Meats, fish, bananas, berries, avocados, broccoli, cauliflower, and corn freeze well.
- Purchase nonperishable foods in bulk. It may cost more upfront to buy "family-sized" products like whole grains, lentils, and dried beans, but the cost per unit is usually cheaper.
- **Buy store-brand items**. They're generally cheaper because less money is spent on advertising and fancy food labels.
- Use what you have before buying more. Take inventory of all the food in your kitchen twice a month. Bring forward the buried items and plan meals based on these ingredients.

Low cost, nutritious foods: Proteins

Beans, Peas, Lentils (dried, frozen, canned)
Canned fish (tuna, salmon, sardines)
Lean ground turkey, Chicken thighs (remove the skin)
Peanut butter, Low-fat cottage cheese
Tofu, Eggs

Produce

Leafy greens (kale, collards)
Whole heads of lettuce or cabbage
Broccoli, Radishes, Carrots
Apples, Bananas
Frozen unsweetened fruit
Frozen or canned vegetables (no salt added)

Whole grains and pastas

Store-brand high-fiber cereals (plain shredded wheat, bran)
Whole rolled oats
Whole grains (brown rice, millet, barley, bulgur)
Whole grain pasta

Snacks

Peanuts, Popcorn cooked in an air-popper, String cheese

Get out in the sunlight or brightly lit spaces, especially early in the day. Set your alarm clock and stick to a sleep routine. Try to spend time with family and friends. Eat healthy foods and avoid overloading on sugar and carbohydrates like cookies and candies.
