Today on the Church Calendar

The Church calendar provides a rhythm to the year based on the revelation of God in Jesus Christ. Each season has a theological theme based on scripture. The Season after Epiphany focuses on revealing who God is, primarily through Jesus is as both fully God and fully human, but also in the revelation of God's attributes and God's direct action in the world.

In this week, the readings from the Revised Common Lectionary point to the redemption that is promised to those who wait. Waiting on the Lord is a spiritual discipline that promises to build our strength.

What is a Call to Worship?

The Call to Worship is an interactive use of scripture, intended to help us remember that every service is a time of worship. God calls us to be citizens in the Kingdom through the church. This part of our liturgy calls the gathered to join the worship.

Psalm 147 is a hymn of praise to the Lord God (YHWH). It opens with a call to worship that praises God for restoring Jerusalem and bringing the people back from exile. This is the healing of the brokenhearted whose wounds are bound after much waiting. Still, the God who is the maker of the universe and the one who controls nature, is still concerned about one small nation and every aspect of nature, even the helpless birds. The Psalmist says that the strength of horses and the speed of runners, which refer to the military, are not what pleases God. Rather, it is those who fear, revere and desire to please God, and those who seek God's faithfulness and love that truly please God.

What is Confession?

To confess is to tell the truth. In this part of the service, we are first called by the church to confess our sins. We then tell the truth about our sins, or our separation from God caused by what we have done or left undone, and what others have done or left undone. By this, action of prayer, we turn away from sin, or repent, and turn toward God's Kingdom.

Since it is God who ultimately calls us to faith and worship, we trust that our repentance is always met with grace, a free gift of mercy.

Forgiveness

Forgiveness is central to the faith of Christians. To forgive is not to say that an offense never occurred, but to tell someone they are guilty, and that you will show mercy.

To repent and be forgiven, is not to convince God that we did nothing wrong, but to give up any attempt to lie to the One who cannot be deceived and accept our conviction with mercy that God promises up front.

What is a Prayer for Illumination?

This prayer asks the Holy Spirit to open our ears to the Word of God and drown out our own voices. In this prayer, we are submitting to God's will, not ours.

Why are we reading these?

At APC, the readings each week are typically drawn from the Revised Common Lectionary, which gives options for readings from the Old and New Testaments, including a selection from one of the gospels.

The suggested readings to draw from for today are from Year B:

- Psalm 147:1-11, 20c
- 1 Corinthians 9:16-23
- Mark 1:29-39



Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God"?



Confession of Faith

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through Him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation He came down from heaven. He was born of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate; He suffered death and was buried. On the third day He rose again in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His kingdom will have no end.

Confession of Faith

The Nicene Creed was written after the Roman Empire legalized the worship of Christ. In doing so, the emperor needed a definition of who is a Christian. So, bishops from all over the empire came together to write this creed to say who Christ is and why He is to be worshipped. The bishops chose not to look at differing regional doctrines, and instead focus on the core truths at the heart of our Christian faith.

This Creed upholds that the Father, Son and Spirit are all co-equal and thus equally the Lord, God of Israel. Each one is fully the One True God, in substance, but each one is a fully distinct person. The Trinity is and of itself a community. We are invited into that community to be loved and to respond with love for God and love one another.

Prayers of the People

Each week the people of God at APC join in prayers of thanksgiving, praise and petition to pray as one community for needs in the church.

Praying for others keeps our focus outward and opens us up to know the will of God in our own lives. Consider making these prayer lists part of your daily prayer life. Doing so, may just help your feelings of isolation. Through prayer, the Holy Spirit brings others, even strangers, closer to you.

The Great Thanksgiving

The Liturgy of the Lord's Supper starts with the Great Thanksgiving, which expresses our Trinitarian beliefs in one God in three persons, namely the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This month it is modeled on the Nicene Creed, which was the first confession of faith put together by church leaders to formalize a shared interpretation of scripture.

What is the Lord's Supper?

After the Protestant Reformation, there has been much debate over the theology of Communion. Nearly every Christian tradition holds it as vital to our worship, but how ranges from views that it is the essence of worship to views that it is a valued symbol we should bring out every now and again. In the Presbyterian Church (USA) we hold that it is a Sacrament, or a visible sign of God's grace. These common elements convey for us a divine reality in Jesus Christ.

In the Lord's Supper, the Holy Spirit draws us into Christ's presence by faith and unites with the Church in every time and place. We are brought into communion with the real presence of the risen Lord through His body and blood by faith, and at the same time, brought into communion with one another as the body of Christ on earth.

This meal is a foretaste of the divine banquet of the new creation, when we will sit at table with each other and our God. It is prefigured in the offering of bread and wine made by Melchizedek with Abraham, the unleavened bread of Passover, the Manna in the wilderness, and the temple bread of the presence.

Home Communion

Your participation does not require communion wafers and grape juice. Use what you have that you think best represents in your context the bread and wine used by Jesus.

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

You are holy, O God of majesty and blessed is your Son, our Lord Jesus the Messiah, the Christ. Fully one with you in being and substance, your Word which is you, by which you created all things, and still our brother, like us in all things but sin.

You shared in our humanity and in the face of Jesus, we glimpse your glory. In the life of Jesus, you revealed the love of your Kingdom. In his death, you demonstrated the lengths to which your love extends, taking our sin and the power of death to the cross for us. In his rising from the grave, we behold your light.

O Lord, we present from your creation these earthly elements of food and drink, which we have gathered here at this table and in our homes. May these be for us like the bread and wine of your table and become for us much more. We partake in this meal with joy remembering your death and resurrection as we await your return, when you will restore heaven and earth as one.

In thanksgiving, we offer ourselves to you to be a holy and living sacrifice dedicated to your service. Conform our minds to your good news and transform our hearts in praise to you Lord Jesus:

All: Dying you destroyed our death.
Rising you restored our life.
Lord Jesus, come in glory.

Gracious God, pour out your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these your gifts of food and drink, grain and grape, that the bread we break and the cup we bless may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ. By your Spirit make us one with Christ, that we may be one with all who share in this feast, united in service in every place.

As this bread is Christ's body for us, send us out to be the body of Christ in the world. As this drink is Christ's blood shed for us, may we be your covenant people to reveal your Reign now and forever. *Amen.*




